A Shriner binds himself to like-minded men in a brotherhood that transcends all religious, ethical, social, cultural, and educational differences.


In fellowship, with his Brothers, a Shriner finds ways in which to serve his God, his family, his fellow man, and his country.



At the current rate of progression, aging being the primary cause, it is estimated there will be only 11,000 Florida Lodge members in five years unless something is done. 28 and still living at home; they work at a service industry job such as coffee shops; they have tattoos; and they don't want to be perfect at one thing, just good enough at several things. We older individuals might tend to prejudge these men, and we might at times reject them from the Degrees of Masonry based on their lifestyles and looks. Although they may be covered in tattoos and look somewhat like a pin cushion, remember this: your parents' generation looked upon your generation in the same way. You were a lost generation.

The Grand Lodge of Florida has two applications to form "Academic Lodges." These lodges will be located on college campuses with the craft consisting of students and faculty members. These lodges will have an age-out limit for students, who at certain ages must seek another Blue Lodge. Millennial Lodges are also being stated with a "Maximum" age limit placed on the craft. Once reaching a certain age, a member would seek another lodge. It was pointed out during the seminar that we must cater to and encourage this generation of men.

The membership situation concerns all of Masonry, and we, as Masons in Florida, must come together in an agreement with ideas such as those written above, but there must be more done by the Grand Lodge of Florida to increase interest and membership in becoming a Mason.

Many states have one-day classes (which was done here before): a joining of Scottish Rite. York Rite and Shrinedom for unification of dates for ceremonial membership if a Master Mason is interested. Shriners are always asked "What does it take?" or "How do I become a Shriner?" Maybe it's time for the Grand Lodge of Florida to cater to and encourage this generation of men, because without Master Masons, the other Masonic organizations will not continue and the Family of Masonry will suffer.



Aluminum Pull-Tabs Help to Repair Wheelchairs

Countless teeny-tiny things have a way of making a huge, important impact on the lives of the kids we help at the Shriners Hospital for Children – Tampa.

The ladies of the Sar-I Court #79, in cooperation with Hospital Transportation driver Fred Ellis, have been making stupendous donations of aluminum can tabs since the "Pull-Tab" project was started at Sahib Shriners in 1992, according to members Marylou Ellis and Chickie Johnson.

"We have been donating to the 'Wheelchair Repair Fund' at the hospital," said Marylou. "The continued efforts of all involved make this project of ours a reality."

As of March 31, 2018, more than 124,000 pounds of tabs and other aluminum has been donated to the hospital according to Ellis and Johnson. That adds up to more than \$67,000 worth of donations since the project began 26 years ago.

"That's a lot of tiny pieces of stuff many just throw away as garbage," said Johnson.

However, it is not just the collection of the tabs that needs attention—it is the cleaning and packaging of the

tabs and other aluminum that needs the expertise of Fred Ellis. He also makes sure the millions of tabs get to Tampa.

This is a major project for the Sar-I ladies and many Sahib Nobles, according to Marylou. She says that they will also accept and pick up aluminum panels and aluminum windows with all screws and any other steel parts removed. Only aluminum can be accepted. The presence of other metals impedes the process.

Marylou and Chickie say they will be happy to speak to groups about their "Pull Tabs" project.

One, of many, Sahib Shriners who has taken this project to heart is Noble Mike Arnold. Mike lives at Westwinds Village in Bradenton, and arranged about two years ago with the management of his community to collect pull-tabs from residents there. The club house is where residents can drop off their aluminum tabs, and

Mike collects them monthly from the president of the association. When functions are held at the club house, people are happy to donate their tabs to help kids. Mike says some residents bring the aluminum directly to him, and he currently has a large bag full of tabs ready for processing. Mike says "thanks to the residents of the Westwinds Village" for their interest and help.

Marylou reminds us: "Every single tab helps a child in need in our Shriners hospitals."

Pull Tabs for Shriners Hospitals

The Ladies of Sar-I Court started in 1992 collecting and donating aluminum pull-tabs to the "Wheel Chair Repair Fund." As of March 31, 2018, they have collected 124,441 lbs., for a total of \$66,809.37 for the Shriners Hospital for Children in Tampa.

Frequently Asked Questions (FAQs) on PULL TABS

- 1. Why not collect the whole can? Collecting complete cans would require a great deal more storage space. You should go ahead and recycle the rest of the can in the normal way, in the dumpster behind Sahib.
- 2. How many tabs in a pound? 1,267.
- How many tabs will a gallon milk jug hold? About 5 pounds worth.
- 4. How does it work and where does the money go? The tabs are delivered to the Sahib office (or almost any Sahib club/unit location) and then taken to the recycling center. The money netted from recycling goes directly into the "Wheel Chair Repair Fund" at the Tampa Shriners Hospital for Children.





Hospital Transportation

Hospital Transportation can be puzzling for the membership. Everybody knows *that* we are, but not *who* we are or how we do it. They see our vans and know some of the drivers, but know little about our process.

It takes a special kind of Shriner to be a driver. Being a driver is all about giving, not taking. Drivers do not do their work in front of an audience or to great acclaim when returning from a trip. To get up at the crack of dawn to be sure a patient is at the hospital or airport on time is a self-motivation thing. The satisfaction that knowing you did your job without being micromanaged shows you are a man of Masonic quality. You know what your responsibilities are as a Hospital Transportation Driver and you carry them out.

Not too many of the membership actually know how we do business and how our unit is structured. We are different from the other units and clubs in that we take direction from basically three different sources: International/Imperial, hospitals, and Sahib Shriners. Each source of direction has a specific purpose, yet they do not control the individual driver. Imperial gives us our rules of structure, the hospital gives the schedules and data, and Sahib Shriners provides our base of operation per HIPAA regulations, finances, and personnel.

The basic functioning unit consists of dispatching. drivers. and vehicles. Dispatching releases the trips to the drivers based on rotation, location, and suitability. Suitability includes dexterity of the driver to maneuver the wheelchair tie-downs, and if a certain patient has an issue that a particular driver is adept at handling. The drivers are required to have a clean driving record that the insurance carrier has reviewed, be under the restricted age limit, and understand the responsibilities of the position. Shriners requires that we have two persons per each

trip, both for safety and legal witness purposes. The vehicles are purchased, decorated, operated, and maintained with donations from our Transportation Fund, a 501(c)(3) organization. A Van Master oversees the routine maintenance and any repairs that need to be made using only ASE certified mechanics.

The patient schedules can have a surgery at 6:00 a.m., which means the drivers pick up the patient and their escort at 4:30 a.m. Other times the patient may have a physical therapy session at 4:00 p.m., which gets the drivers back at the temple around 7:00 p.m. The airport trips can be on Saturday or Sunday, and at times last from 6:00 a.m. to 11:00 p.m. Servicing the local hospital is basically a 225-day-a-year job, and serving the out-oftown hospitals can be a 325-day-a-year job. The majority of the local trips, 75%, are for appointments between 8:00 a.m. and 4:00 p.m.

A typical trip would have the driver and co-driver safety-checking the vehicle, then proceeding to pick up the patient and their escort at their residence, transporting them to the hospital, waiting until the treatment or clinic visit is completed, then transporting the patient and their escort back to their residence. The drivers then return the vehicle to the parking sheds gassed up, with trip logs updated, ready for the next trip.

Freemasonry calls upon the wisdom of all ages, religions, philosophies, and serious thinkers. This missive concludes the writer's ramblings about Confucius by exploring his teachings about Leading through Example. His teachings in this vein sound quite Masonic, and if not, at least worthy of consideration.



It is easy to preach to or exhort proper, moral, and virtuous behavior. It is quite another to lead, guide, convince, and persuade others by example.

In the Analects 13.1, Confucius gets to the point: "Make yourself a model and inspire the people...be unrelenting in your efforts."

What are our frailties? Sloth, quickness to anger, intolerance, intemperance, obstinacy?

We, as Masons, should radiate the message that we can govern our conduct and subdue our passions. In paying attention to our own shortcomings, we, with subtlety, are aiding, influencing, and rectifying others'.

Our Brethren, and the profane, watch our

behavior. In *Analects 2.3* we are counseled to "lead with excellence, regulate with ritual conduct, and inspire others to bring order to their lives."

Success cannot be willed for the Fraternity, nor for society, nor for ourselves. It cannot be willed at all. Failure and success are not a matter of chance. Success or failure are a matter of personal character and conscious effort. They are a decision.

Confucius reminds us that no amount of coercion or punishment can come close to accomplishing what a "shining personal example" can. We must think beyond ourselves to consider what our conduct portrays to others, what people see in us, what they see us do, and what they hear us say.

Freemasonry and the Scottish Rite capture and inculcate the concept of exemplary conduct and example in the Blue Lodge and the Lodge of Perfection degrees.

Confucius captures it in a metaphor in the *Analects 12.19*, "the abilities of the exemplary person resemble the wind, while that of the petty person resembles the grass. The wind blows and the grass bends in response."

Wow.

Let us govern ourselves accordingly and lead by example. Let us be "the wind" that allows us to successfully contribute to, or even make a difference, in the world.

Tampa Hospital's Golden Retriever Therapy Dog

For Riley the therapy dog, April 5 [2017] was a day like no other. Camera crews greeted the golden retriever as he trotted through the entry way and prepared to greet the patients at the Tampa Shriners Hospital for the 200th time.

For nearly five years, Riley and "dad" Marc Rebhun have brought smiles to the faces of our patients' families, hospital staff, volunteers, other hospital visitors, and Shriners. Riley knows the hospital so well that he leads Marc from area to area, always knowing what to expect around each corner: open arms, happy faces, and sometimes banana chips.

Riley's milestone visit was no different, except for the entourage of photographers following him. Riley stopped to pose for pictures, snuggle up close with a familiar face, and do what he does best; bring comfort and joy to patients who may be dealing with physical challenges or upcoming surgeries.

In addition to making frequent hospital visits, Riley has been a regular guest at Camp Care-A-Lot, put on by hospital staff for patients who otherwise would be unable to attend a summer camp. He also never misses the players' visit to the hospital that precedes the annual East-West Shrine Game.

Riley is a rescue dog from Golden Retriever Rescue of Mid-Florida. The organization obtained him from a family who bought him and realized they were not prepared for the energy of the typical golden retriever puppy. Rebhun and his family applied to the rescue and on November 28, 2010, adopted Riley.

"He immediately was a hit during the walks in the neighborhood," Rebhun said. "Riley began training classes and passed his evaluation with Therapy Dog International just after his second birthday. Less than two months later, he began volunteering at Shriners Hospital for Children – Tampa."

"This has been the best day," Marc said. "For me, for Riley, and for all of us. Thank you so much!"

The story above was originally published in April of 2017, but there's more to know. According to Golden Retriever Rescue of Mid-Florida's <u>website</u>, "As of May 2018, Riley has now received the Therapy Dog International Remarkable Volunteer Award and TDI recognition title of TDIRVA for completing 250 documented therapy visits.



Marc Rebhun notes "[Riley's] personality, his intelligence, his love of people, and his wanting to please shone through and we knew he had potential to be a therapy dog."

Riley "is a natural at the hospital and has earned the trust to be allowed not only in patients' rooms, but also in some of the preparation and recovery areas. The physical therapists are experts at leveraging the pups to encourage the children in their sometimes grueling exercises; turning work into fun."

Rebhun cited an example: "During one visit a staff member came to us explaining there was a child outside who was afraid to enter the facility and thought Riley could be of help. Outside on a bench we found a young boy sobbing. As soon as Riley put his head in the boy's lap and looked up with those big brown eyes, the flood of tears stopped...[the boy] continued to stroke and pet Riley who responded with deep sighs. Riley helped him get over his initial fear and the young boy decided that if Riley worked there it must be a pretty nice place."




